Bird Nesting Boxes Update

AOF's Bird Box Monitor program is nearing the end of the nesting season. Our first year has been much more successful than we anticipated. Three volunteers have checked these boxes weekly for nest activity and progress. They have watched for any problems such as pest infestation or predation by raccoons and have kept records of each box. Approximately 75% of the boxes have been used by a variety of cavity nesting birds: chickadees, house wrens, tree swallows, nuthatches and bluebirds. These results will be sent into NestWatch, a Cornell University ornithological clearing house. Thanks to AOF's Citizen Scientists!

Turkey Vultures are Our Friends!

Our first instinct when we hear the word "vulture" is to say "lck!" but hold on a minute! Vultures are an important part of a healthy ecosystem and you should be grateful when you spot them soaring high in the sky.

Turkey vultures, (*Cathartes aura*) are the most likely species that you will see in Lake County and are nature's cleanup crew. Unlike most birds, they have a strong sense of smell and can detect fresh carcasses from miles away. They circle the area with wings in a wobbly V formation until they spot their prey. They don't mind being around human's habitations and you'll often see them on the side of the road, enjoying their next meal.

When it's time to reproduce, vultures chose a mate by gathering in a circle with wings slightly spread and doing a little hopping dance. When a mate is chosen the pair then soar together in the air as if playing tag.

Their nest is a sad affair. Vulture parents choose to nest in the inside of a hollow tree, in dense bushes or secluded spots in old buildings. Very little padding is provided for the eggs; they are often laid directly on debris. 1-3 eggs are laid and are incubated for 34-41 days. The vulture parents make up for the lousy nursery conditions by being excellent parents. One parent remains with the chicks most of the time. Both parents feed the young a nutritious liquid by regurgitation. The young fledge (leave the nest) at about 9 weeks of age

Vultures benefit humans by improving our human esthetics. They remove dead carcasses from our roadways thereby eliminating the stench and unsightliness of a dead animal. They eat carcasses that would otherwise spread diseases to human beings via insects or groundwater contamination. So now when you see a graceful group of vultures soaring overhead instead of saying "Ick", say "Thank You".
